
## From the President

## **TRIBUTE TO FAY F. RUSSELL**



**Fay Russell, R.N., M.S.N.**, immediate past editor of PostScripts, passed away December 24, 2008. On September 1, 1967, Ms. Russell became the first Chief of Nursing at the UT Child Development Center ( now Boling Center for Developmental Disabilities). Ms Russell has been honored for her pioneering leadership in establishing one of this nation's first Maternal Child Health funded Early Intervention Interdisciplinary teams. Many early intervention programs in the community today are outgrowths of that first program and give testimony to the influence and mentorship Ms. Russell provided to graduate level professionals and other program leaders. For almost four decades, Ms. Russell provided dedicated service to children born with Down Syndrome and other disabilities, their families, the graduate level trainees of the Boling Center, and students in the UT College of Nursing. Ms. Russell was an inspiration to her colleagues, an energetic, conscientious professional who remained in touch with the Boling Center and the University throughout her retirement years. An interdisciplinary training room in the Boling Center was dedicated to Ms. Russell upon her retirement.

Fay was a member of the Who's Who of Women, and Sigma Theta Tau Honorary Nursing Society. A deacon at the Idlewild Presbyterian Church for many years, and later an elder of LaGrange Presbyterian Church, Fay and her husband George, who preceded her in death, have two children, Patricia LaStarr Russell Dolan (John) and Perry Lamont Russell (Rebecca). Fay has five grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Ms. Russell will be missed by her family and colleagues; she will also be fondly remembered as a person who made a difference in the lives of so many.

## RETIREE SPOTLIGHT



**Ms. Annie Payne** worked at UTHSC for thirty years before her retirement, Annie began her service in 1969 in the Dunn Dental Building. During her career, Annie worked in sterilization, as a cashier, a receptionist, and finally in medical records; she enjoyed everything about her various jobs.

Now, Annie devotes much of her time to church responsibilities at the Pentecostal Temple COGIC where she teaches in Sunday School and sings in the choir. Annie has also served as the coordinator for Neighborhood Watch in her community.

Annie likes to work in her yard, and she also likes traveling; she has been to Phoenix, Indianapolis, Chicago, and many regional sites of interest and area museums. Annie stays busy with her family. She has four children, six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.



**Ms. Carrie Robinson** retired in 1990 after 27 years at UT Bowld Hospital where she worked in the nursing department as a representative for employee benefits. Today, Carrie is actively involved at St. Peter's Catholic Church in community service programs. St. Peter's sponsors a year round program in conjunction with the old Allen Station North Precinct police division. Members of St. Peter's donate stuffed animals to be sent to shut-ins and the critically ill. Carrie prepares the baskets for the shut-ins, and police officers from the north precinct deliver them. This program is intended to build trust between police and the community. In the past two years, over 500 baskets have been distributed.

Carrie is also a member of the Citizens Police Academy, and she has been on "ride-alongs" with the police officers. These ride-alongs gave Carrie insight about what happens during a police officer's shift. Carrie says the police officers are "not just out there". She has a memory of her worst trip being one where the police answered a call related to a domestic issue. In addition to this volunteer work, Carrie is also the Chairman of the Lutheran Village Neighborhood Watch.
