# THE ASKLEPIEION

After twelve years of not having a yearbook for the U.T. Memphis campus, the Student Government Association Executive Council revived THE ASKLEPIEION. Student editors were recruited and the action began . . . organizing photographs, writing copy, designing layouts and exploring ideas. Everyone pitched in to create this new yearbook. The theme of the book is the 75th Anniversary of the U.T. Memphis campus. The explanation of the name of the book was taken from the 1972 issue of THE ASKLEPIEION: Asklepieion: a word derived from the name of Aesculapius, the greek god of medicine and healing. Aesculapius was honored and worshipped through the greek world by persons seeking the healing powers of the physician. Temples were erected in honor of Aesculapius near healing springs or high mountains. Those who worshipped and followed him were known as Aesculapae, therefore, the temples in his honor were known as the Aesculapions (Asklepieions). In the ancient city of Memphis on the Nile River there was a temple where persons went for worship, and for care. In our modern city of Memphis on the Mississippi River people come to the Asklepieion for healing and care.

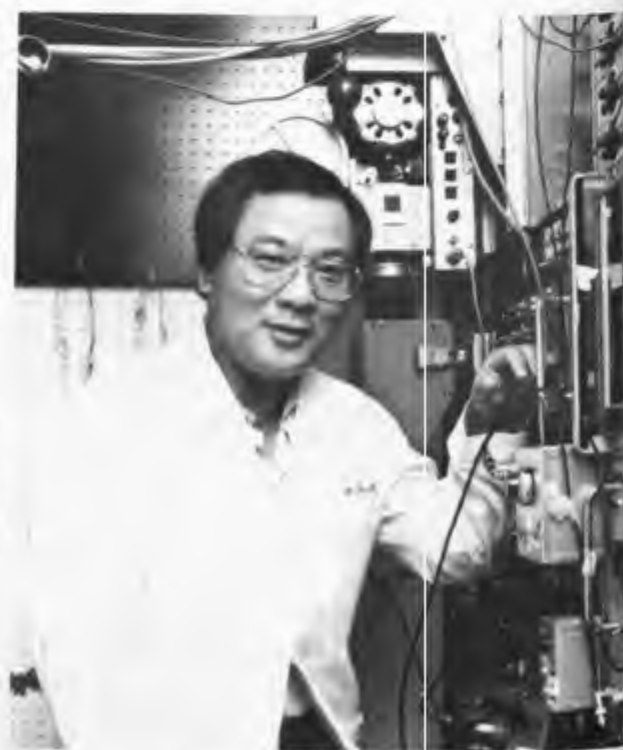

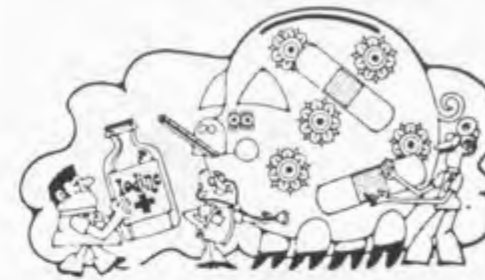

## AIMS

The AIMS Program: Aid for the Impaired Medical Student. In an effort to prevent impaired physicians by intervening early in the impairment process, the AIMS Program was established. The AIMS Program is administered by a council composed of eight students and eight physicians/staff. The general goals of the AIMS Program are: 1) To provide compassionate assistance to impaired students before they are irreversibly harmed. 2) To provide help in a way that fully protects the rights of impaired students to receive treatment in strictest confidence. 3) To assure that recovered students are able to continue their medical education without stigma or penalty, and 4) To protect patients and others from the harm the impaired students may cause.

## OSR

Yes, we used to sit around sometimes and groan and moan about mutual friends we all had who just couldn't get in, and knowing these people as we did it seemed unfathomable; just what the hell were those admissions committees looking for? Regardless of how this year was spent, this was also the time when we would try and put all the pieces together, trying to get the "big picture," for we finally realized that these four years weren't individual races but one long race and we had finally reached the finish line.



The Class of 1986 is on the way out. Some out of state, some out of Memphis, and all out of school into a new world as physicians. We've had glimpses into that new world, a cosmos of needles and vials and differential diagnoses — now our role will carry real responsibility, exciting but frightening. Those orders we debated sagely with our residents will be written by us, and sagely or not will be taken off and injected into pulsing and speaking and living human beings. We'll be physicians though the title will never have less behind it than during the year beginning this June 14th. Shells and skins of doctors will be sent out and expected to do the work of real clinicians. Hopefully these shells will prove to be of an especial sturdiness, a type which will capably absorb the invaluable experience that dozens of failures, gaffes, and blunders will bring. Those people we are to love, fear, hurt, and help are at home now, resting quietly. We'll see them this fall and do the best we can . . .

What we'll be doing will of course vary widely. School is behind, the world ahead, and there are many paths to tread. Through shadow to the edge of night, until the stars are all alight. No doubt twenty years from now our differences will seem far to outweigh any ancient similarities. For four years we shared, feared, exalted, and exulted in the same things, people and problems. The twenty years ahead are no doubt bright with promise, eagerly we'll step to meet them but something is lost when we leave this nest. Lost forever. For better or for worse, you and I will never pass this way again.



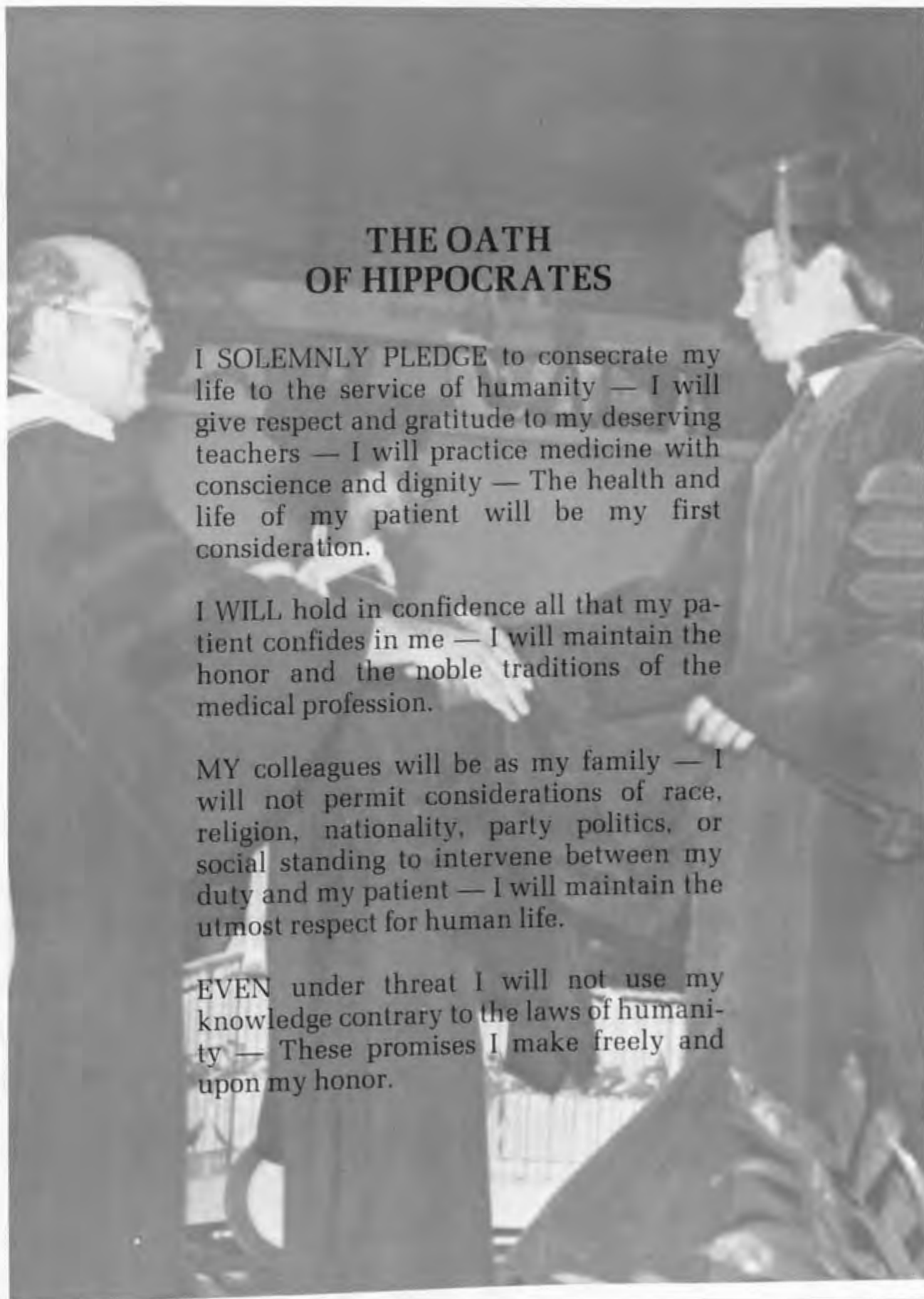
## THE OATH OF HIPPOCRATES

MY colleagues will be as my family — I will not permit considerations of race, religion, nationality, party politics, or social standing to intervene between my duty and my patient — I will maintain the utmost respect for human life.

EVEN under threat I will not use my knowledge contrary to the laws of humanity — These promises I make freely and upon my honor.



The College of Dentistry was founded in Nashville in 1878. The work of the College was moved from Nashville to Memphis in 1910 and became the University of Memphis College of Dental Surgery. In 1911 when the University of Tennessee moved its medical units to Memphis in order to secure larger facilities for the clinical work, the authorities of the University of Memphis transferred to the Board of Trustees of the University of Tennessee all of its equipment and the good will of its Dental Department. The College of Dentistry occupied the old Rogers Hall from 1919 to 1949. In 1949, the College moved to 847 Monroe. As the need for more space and modern equipment became apparent, the Dunn Dental Building was built to meet the growing demands. The College moved into the building in 1977.

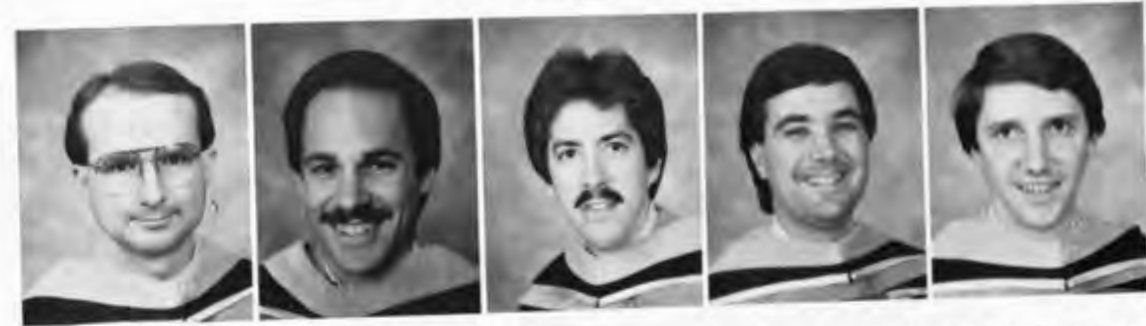

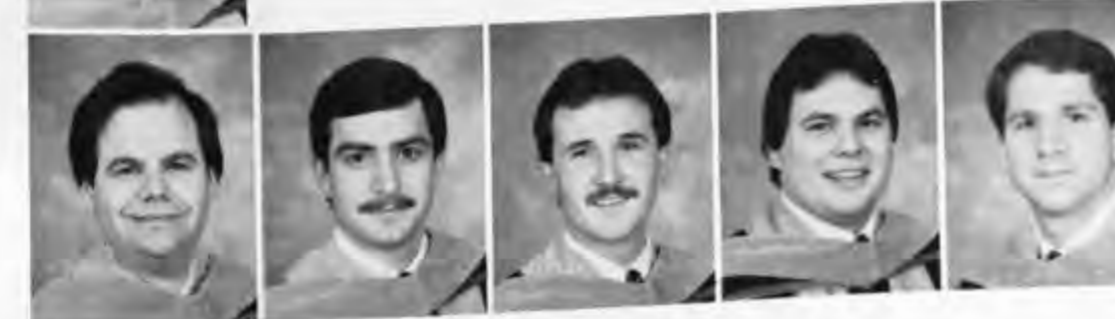

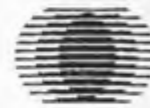

On November 15, 1882, seven dental students met at Mrs. Slattery's boarding house in Ann Arbor and founded the first dental fraternity in the world. It was intended to bring together not only the most talented students of dentistry while in school, but by the establishment of the Supreme Chapter, it brought in the outstanding teachers and practitioners. Professional fraternities have strong faculty support because of the high standards required for the establishment of a chapter on a campus. A good scholastic average is an important criterion for membership. These fraternities feature active alumni associations. Nowhere in the history of Delta Sigma Delta has it been written that we must initiate the largest number of candidates. On the contrary, the literature is replete with the philosophy of selectivity. However, Delta Sigma Delta is the second largest fraternity on the J. T. Memphis campus. The Kappa Kappa chapter is the largest and fastest growing chapter in the country amongst Delta Sigs.

## PSI OMEGA

Psi Omega was founded in Georgia in 1842 by William Hamilton and one of his colleagues. Since then, this two-member fraternity has grown to cover the nation and to join thousands of dental students and alumni as brothers.

Psi Omega at the University of Tennessee has been an important part of campus life for decades. The Psi-O house which is located near Overton Park provides the perfect location for students to spend their free time. It is the site of numerous campus gatherings and offers Psi-O's an outdoor pool to relax by.

Psi-O was founded to establish a means for students to get to know one another, to form friendships, and to help each other. The basis of Psi-O is that there are other outlets besides academic that are important in obtaining a well-rounded education. Psi-O is therefore an active participant in intramural sports, charity fund raisers, and campus parties. 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On March 7, 1986, as part of the dental jurisprudence course, D-4 class members participated in a mock malpractice trial, held in a courthouse in downtown Memphis. John Malingerer (Chris Austin) had visited his dentist, Dr. I. M. Faithful (Tommy Spears), in Paris, Tennessee, to have a tooth extracted. Dr. Faithful had received his education at Harvard School of Dental Medicine, but then had completed and refined his education at UT, Memphis. However, on this particular occasion, he had not exposed a pre-operative radiograph of Mr. Malingerer's aching tooth. Dr. Faithful had trouble in extracting the offending tooth; and then decided to leave the tooth root tips in Mr. Malingerer's jaw. Several days later, Mr. Malingerer reported to Baptist Hospital, and was treated by Dr. Monte Metro (Monte Parsons) for an infection. Mr. Malingerer sued Dr. Faithful for failure to practice within the standard of care of his community (he had not exposed a pre-op x-ray), among other things. The morning spent in court was educational, interesting, and was a welcome change from the regular classroom setting.



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The annual Table Clinic Competition was held February 28, 1986. The competition included over 60 clinical and research presentations prepared by dental students, faculty and staff, plus presentations by dental graduate students, dental hygiene students, dental assisting and laboratory technician students. Dr. Shannon (Oral Surgery) said, "The Table Clinic competition provides students, faculty and staff members the opportunity to present new ideas in both basic science research and clinical practice and techniques. It also provides a forum for exchange between the university community and the student and professional members of the college." The Table Clinic competition is part of an annual seminar series sponsored by the College of Dentistry's Alumni Association, scheduled to launch off Alumni Weekend. The overall grand prize winner received an all expense paid trip to Miami, FL, to represent the UT Memphis College of Dentistry at the American Dental Association's annual session in October. First and second cash awards of \$200 and \$100 respectively were awarded to winners in both the clinical applications and techniques category and the basic science and research category. 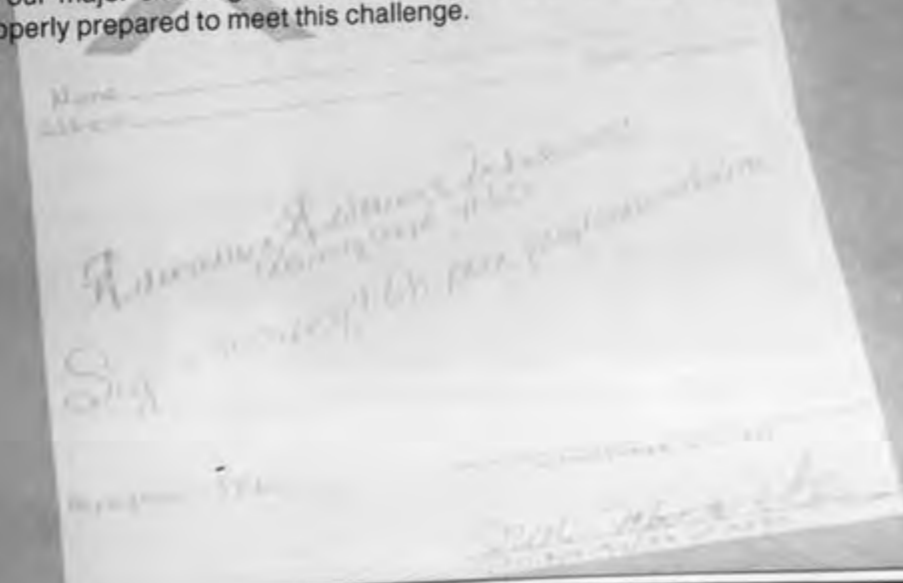


## The Challenge For The Future

During the 1970's pharmacy education and curriculums in our colleges of pharmacy were relatively stable. The science of pharmacy and the technology supporting that science remained fairly constant. Changes in the practice of pharmacy were influenced primarily by competitive forces in the marketplace. Institutional based practices began to command a much larger share of pharmacy manpower. The chain industry's percentage of the total market grew significantly between 1970 and 1980.

The decade of the 1980's in bringing with it different kinds of changes and the changes of the '80's relate to significant improvements in technology and to the emphasis placed by those controlling health care expenditures on cost containment. The computer has matured and is a common tool in the practice of pharmacy. This mechanical source of information is providing a data base which allows pharmacists to use their scientific training to solve drug related problems. Never before has the pharmacy practitioner had the opportunity to use so much of the information that is part of the learning process. The information relevant to the practice of pharmacy is doubling and redoubling at a rate that is almost alarming. This will place new demands on tomorrow's pharmacists and provide them with increased challenges. Technological advances in the pharmaceutical industry are rapidly changing the way in which drugs are delivered in the body. Sustained release systems, therapeutic patches implants and other novel therapeutic delivery methods will dramatically change the way we practice our profession.

The people who are paying the majority of the health care bills — the federal, state and local government along with big business and industry — are demanding that we reduce the cost of health care delivery to our consumers. This means that we as pharmacists will have to use the information and new technology to assist us in developing a more cost effective way of providing pharmacy related services. Using this available information and technology to develop a more cost effective method of pharmaceutical services delivery will be our major challenge for the future. We are confident our graduates will be properly prepared to meet this challenge.

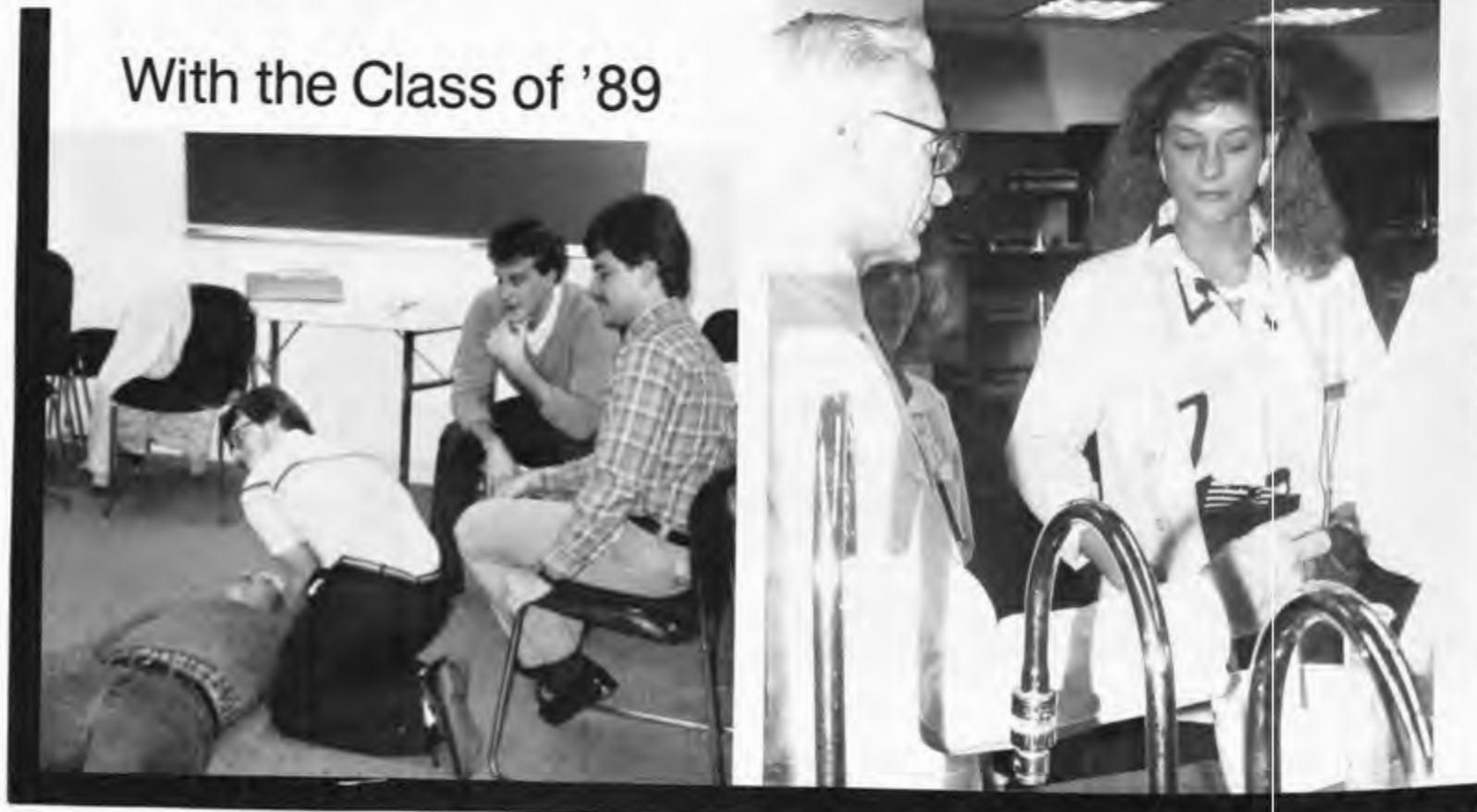

## The Alpha Nu Chapter Rho Chi

In the early stages of development, RHO CHI began as the "Aristolochite Society" established in 1908 by the Pharmacy Department of the University of Michigan. In 1917 another movement to establish a national honor society for pharmacy was begun by the American Conference of Pharmaceutical Faculties. Soon thereafter the Aristolochite Society changed the name of their organization to RHO CHI, as represented by the respective Greek letters, and was awarded a charter from the state of Michigan on May 19, 1922. Recognizing that RHO CHI offered ideas and objectives similar to those the conference was seeking to establish, the movement to create a competing society disbanded and RHO CHI became recognized as "The Honor Society of Pharmacy." The Alpha Mu Chapter here at U.T. Memphis was chartered in 1949 and continues to follow the fundamental objectives of RHO CHI "to promote the advancement of the pharmaceutical sciences through the encouragement and recognition of sound scholarship."

Through the years the development of the College of Nursing has paralleled the development of progressive trends in nursing education. Early beginnings were in the Memphis City Hospital Training School for Nurses, which was established in 1898 as the first continuing school of nursing in Tennessee, the first chartered by the State, and one of the first established in the region. The school was founded largely through the efforts of Lena Angevine Warner, a native of the Mississippi Delta who was willing to pioneer in a needed area of social reform.

In 1926, through a fifty year contractual arrangement between the University of Tennessee and the Hospital, a "training school for nurses" became the joint responsibility of the University and Hospital, replacing the previous program.

By 1949, the School of Nursing had become an autonomous unit of the University with an appointed dean. In 1961 the title of the school was changed to college. The first baccalaureate program was offered in 1950. Since 1960, the baccalaureate program has been fully accredited by the National League for Nursing, and in 1976 the graduate program received full accreditation.

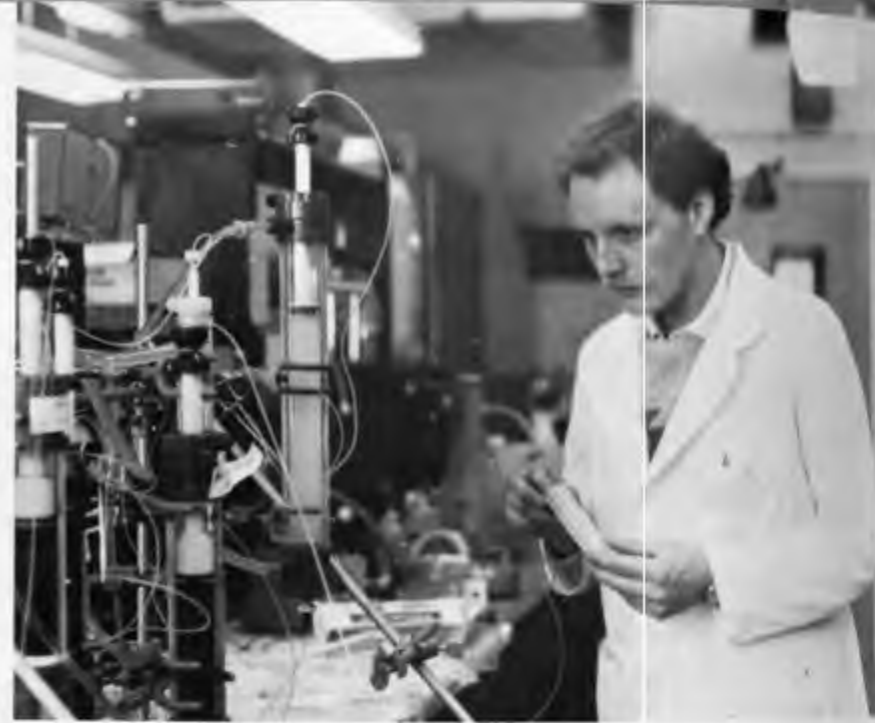

The Graduate School at UT Memphis was organized under the leadership of Dr. T. P. Nash, Jr. in 1923. The presentation of a Master's thesis by Ben King Harned marked the formal beginning of the School in 1925 when the Graduate Committee at Knoxville accepted Harned's thesis for the M.S. with a major in pharmacology. Subsequently, the graduate program leading to the Ph.D. was approved for presentation in the School of Biological Sciences in 1928. Dr. E. Foster Williams was the first to complete the program and was awarded the Ph.D. in Biochemistry in 1932. This was the first doctorate of philosophy awarded at any of the campuses of the University of Tennessee.

Until 1960, the Graduate School at Memphis operated as a division of the Graduate School in Knoxville with Dr. R. H. Alden as Associate Dean of the Graduate School.

The present Graduate School of Medical Sciences was then established as a separate entity with its own Graduate Council and bylaws. Dr. Alden was named the first dean. Graduate training was offered in Anatomy, Biochemistry, Microbiology, Pharmacology, Physiology and Biophysics, and Pathology. Later, programs in the Pharmaceutical Sciences were organized and have developed into Medicinal Chemistry, Pharmaceutics, and Pharmacy Administration.

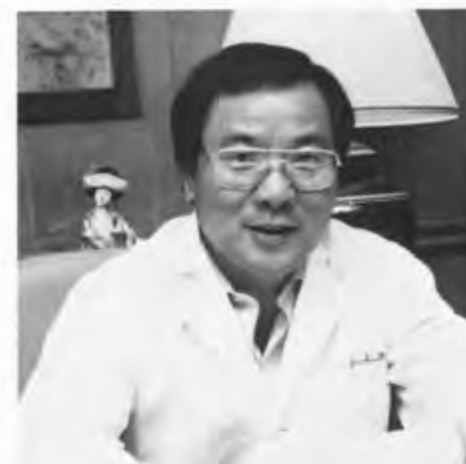

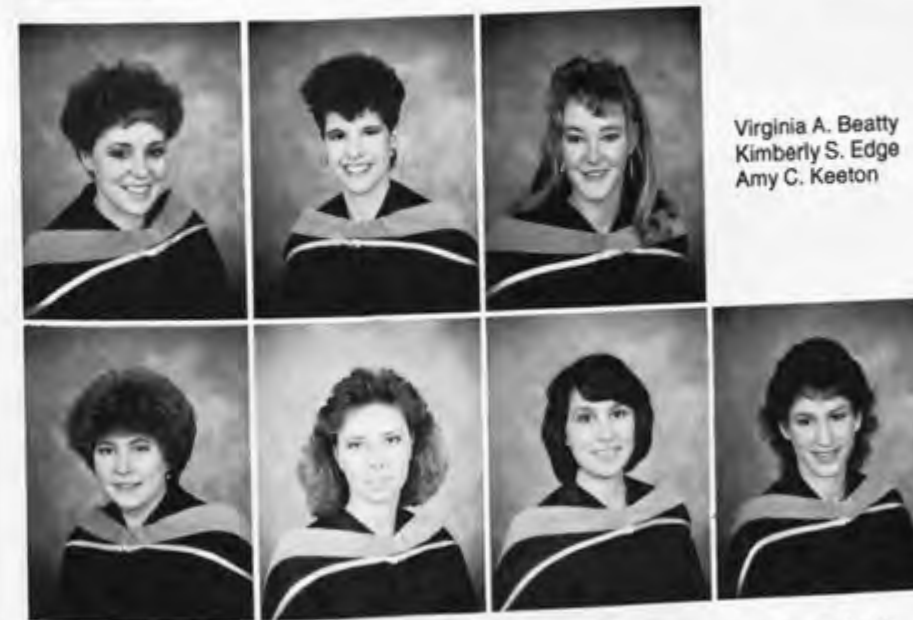

The University of Tennessee College of Social Work is the only graduate professional social work education program in Tennessee with degrees offered at the bachelor's, master's and doctoral levels. During its forty-year history, the College has provided the state and region with qualified professionally trained social workers. Many of these graduates have assumed key leadership roles as expert practitioners, supervisors, and administrators in such fields as mental health and mental retardation, health, rehabilitation, family, and children's services, public welfare, aging, and corrections. The contributions of these graduates have made a significant difference in the provision of quality social services in both public and private voluntary agencies and programs.

The College is a part of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville Campus and the Dean, Dr. Ben Granger is based in Knoxville. Each branch has an associate Dean, who reports to the Dean; the Memphis Branch Associate Dean is Dr. Nellie Tate. The Memphis Branch was originally opened in 1950 and continued to operate through 1960. In 1965 the College re-opened and is currently located on the third floor of The Administration Annex Faculty Building, with an approximate enrollment of 100 students.

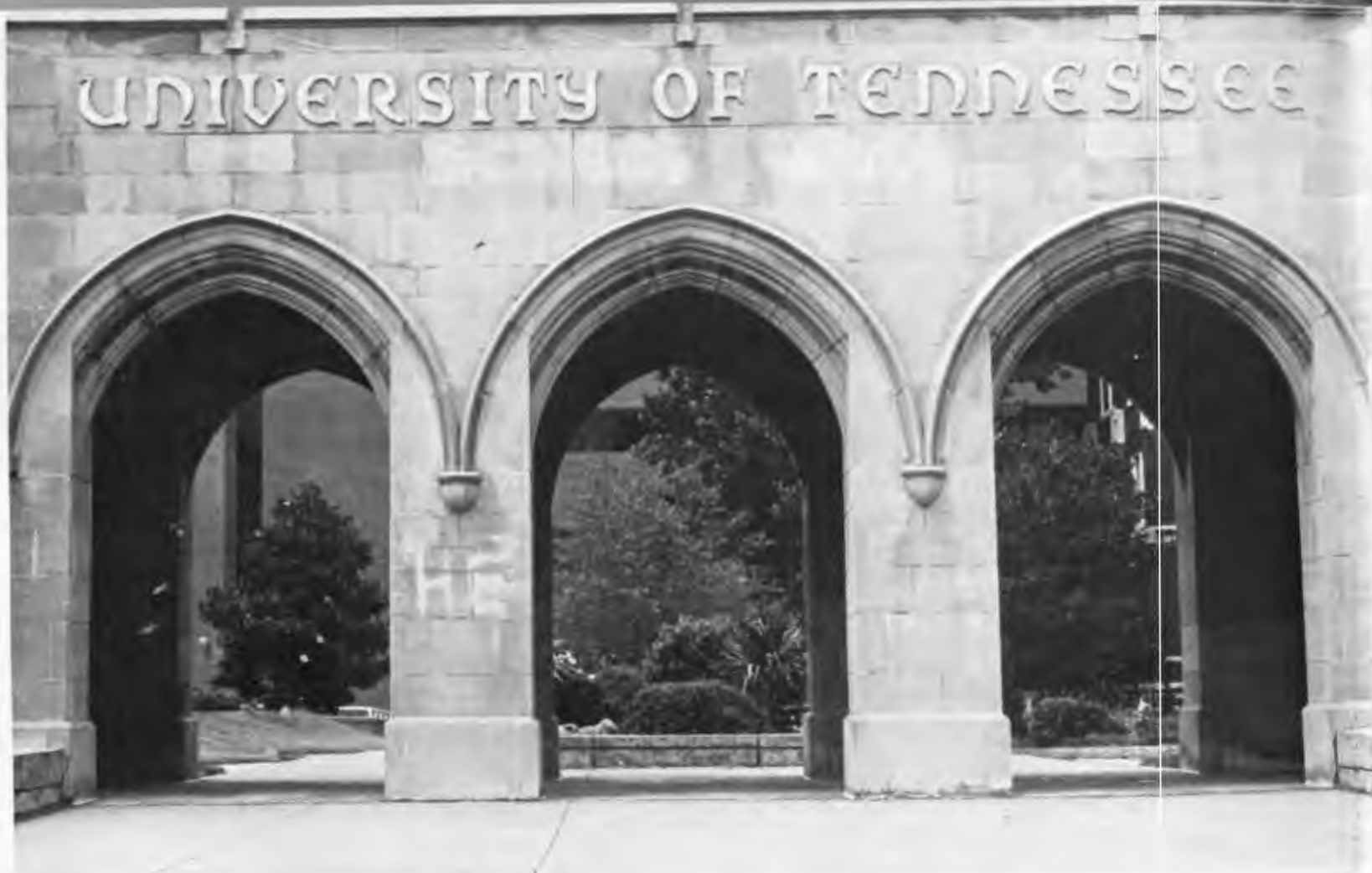

**How far have we come?**

"One year ago last summer I started out with the avowed purpose of combining four medical schools... As a result of recent action, four schools have been consolidated in Memphis, leaving the entire field at Nashville open to Vanderbilt, and giving the University of Tennessee the whole field at Memphis."

Brown Ayres, President  
University of Tennessee, 1913

Today, the University of Tennessee, Memphis has indeed fulfilled Ayres' dream of serving "the whole field at Memphis." One of the largest health science centers in the nation, UT Memphis' 75 years of instruction, research and service to and for all Tennesseans has produced more than 25,000 graduates from the colleges of Allied Health, Dentistry, Medicine, Pharmacy, Nursing and the Graduate School.

To fulfill its mission in instruction, UT Memphis employs almost 2,000 full, part-time and volunteer faculty members. The University maintains clinical affiliation with a number of related health care institutions, including LeBonheur Children's Medical Center, Memphis Veterans Administration Medical Center, Baptist Memorial Hospital, Methodist Hospital, St. Francis Hospital, Memphis Mental Health Center and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. In addition, UT Memphis administers the UT Medical Center, which includes the 160-bed William F. Bowld Hospital, and the National Institutes of Health-Funded Clinical Research Center.

To fulfill its mission in research, UT Memphis has aggressively sought and received an average of \$15 million in research grants each year, including a \$2 million gift from the Kellogg Foundation to study health promotion and disease prevention over a four-year period. The University has also established nine endowed professorships since 1981, received a record \$3 million bequest from the estate of Harriet Van Vleet and plans to accomplish additional endowments campus-wide.

To fulfill its mission in service, UT Memphis participates in a number of community outreach programs. Through its involvement in the many projects like the Southern Poison Center, the Regional Newborn Center, the Children and Youth Project, a rehabilitation engineering program, a Down Syndrome early intervention program, and the provision of low cost dental care, the University serves as an active and caring member of the Memphis/Mid-South/Tennessee community.

**Getting Started**

The school that would eventually become UT Memphis really began in 1910. That year, an attempted merger between the medical departments of the University of Nashville and the University of Tennessee in Nashville failed. When administrators from the University of Nashville transferred the school's equipment to the University of Tennessee and quietly went out of business, UT administrators began searching for a location where their suddenly expanded medical department could make a fresh start.

At the same time, a turn-of-the-century reform movement was sweeping medical education. In 1899, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching sent the noted educator Abraham Flexner on fact-finding tours of U.S. medical schools. Flexner visited Tennessee in 1910, and with little exception, labelled its medical schools needlessly competitive, poorly funded and injurious to the public health.

Although Flexner's report shocked and scandalized many medical educators, it also helped shape their thinking. Perhaps one re-organized school could succeed where five disorganized institutions were clearly failing?

UT's attention focused on Memphis, which as the largest city in the state also claimed the largest number of prospective patients. A visit to the city in 1911 by President Ayres resulted in a \$10,000 offer by the Business Men's Club of Memphis to underwrite UT's takeover of the Memphis College of Physicians and Surgeons and the University of Memphis College of Dentistry.

With the scent of merger in the air, administrators from the UT Department of Pharmacy in Knoxville hastened to join their medical and dental colleagues in Memphis, and the UT Medical Units became a reality in 1911.

## Years of Consolidation

The struggle to establish the UT Medical Units did not end in 1911. UT's early history was beset by problems, not the least of which was the difficulty of molding the faculty of four previously autonomous schools into one cohesive group. Into this leadership vacuum stepped O. W. "Pinky" Hyman, a vigorous administrator who was able to provide the direction the Medical Units desperately needed.

Hyman was instrumental in launching an extensive building campaign, elevating the Department of Pharmacy to College status in 1925, acquiring the School of Nursing from the City of Memphis in 1926, organizing the School of Biological Science in 1927, and adding graduate instruction for master of science and doctor of philosophy degrees in 1928.

By Hyman's retirement in 1961, the university had grown from a two-building Medical Unit to a 61-acre health science campus. Successive administrations continued Hyman's work, initiating a second building boom during the 1970s, adding the university's fifth school — the College of Community and Allied Health Professions — in 1972, and taking control of the University of Tennessee Medical Center in 1980.

Today, Chancellor James Hunt is committed to preserving and expanding the tradition of excellence begun by the UT Medical Units in 1911. "UT Memphis is the hub of the Memphis Medical Center. Working together, we constitute a powerful force in biomedical science, health professional education and health care delivery," stated Hunt in a recent interview.

"We look with confidence to the future, knowing our good programs are rapidly becoming even better as a result of strong support from citizens of Memphis, Shelby County, the Mid-South and Tennessee."
