









Principles of indirect inlay technique are learned in operative dentistry.

The pathologist demonstrates a pathological lesion to students on autopsy call.






Wax patterns are carved to correct form prior to casting in gold for partial denture abutments.



#### COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

The College of Medicine was founded in 1876 in Nashville, transferred to Memphis in 1911 and during the past 52 years has grown to become one of the larger medical centers. The College of Medicine maintains a balanced curriculum with sufficient flexibility to train and graduate students in the medical profession as family doctors, specialists, fellows of research and instructors in medical colleges.

Pre-clinical study through lectures and laboratory training in courses of Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry, and Pathology provide fundamental knowledge of health and disease. Clinical years are spent in the continuation and application of study in the out-patient clinics and within the University staffed hospitals and laboratories. Increasing opportunities are becoming available for those students interested in research. At the University of Tennessee, medical students are uniquely fortunate in being able to participate in the family care program, as a student doctor to a carefully selected indigent family under the close supervision of staff physicians.








### COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY

The College of Dentistry was established in Nashville in 1878. It was moved to Memphis in 1911. The present facilities of the dental building offer the student all of the modern eqiupment used in the profession today. The curriculum is divided into two phases, pre-clinical and clinical work. In the beginning years, the student studies basic medical sciences and courses in dental anatomy, designed to improve his manual dexterity as he familiarizes himself with basic tooth anatomy. Technique courses are added to the curriculum as the student progresses. During this period, he becomes familiar with the various phases of operative dentistry and crown and bridge and complete denture prosthetics. The clinical years are spent utilizing the knowledge learned by applying these principles in the restoration of the oral cavity. The student developes a working knowledge of all phases of dentistry by working under the supervision of qualified instructors in the various fields, which include surgery, periodontics, pedodontics, diagnosis, operative dentistry, crown & bridge prosthetics and partial and complete denture prosthetics.









# COLLEGE OF PHARMACY

# COLLEGE OF NURSING

The College of Nursing was first established in 1898 as the Training School of the Memphis General Hospital. In 1926 it became the University of Tennessee School of Nursing as the result of an arrangement between Memphis General Hospital and the University. The School became autonomous in 1949 and established a program leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 1950. The current program, inaugurated in 1958, requires students to spend one year in a liberal arts college. During three years at the Medical Units, nursing students broaden and supplement their knowledge with related subjects as well as those directly concerned with the profession of nursing.






# GRADUATE SCHOOL-MEDICAL SCIENCES

After a slow but steady increase in membership, Psi Chapter moved to its present location at 242 South Pauline, and since that time has become the largest pharmacy fraternity at the University of Tennessee. We boast 99 active members and are presently the second largest Kappa Psi Chapter in the United States. This year marked the 50th anniversary of Psi Chapter. This was celebrated by an open house and a banquet and dance held at the Hotel Chisca. Several of the national officers of Kappa Psi attended including Dr. Glen Sperandio, First Grand Vice Regent. The men of Kappa Psi hold many of the class offices as well as offices in the other various organizations on the campus. Psi Chapter is always a competitor in the intramural league participating in all athletic contests. Our chapter is especially fortunate to have such fine supervision from our faculty members, Dr. J. E. Haberle, our Grand Council Deputy, Prof. William B. Swafford, and Dr. Karl J. Goldner. Kappa Psi is a member of the Professional Interfraternity Conference organized in 1928 to encourage high scholarship, professional research, advancement of professional ethics, and the promotion of a spirit of comity among the professional fraternities



in the advancement of fraternal ideas.


March 26, 1921. It remained an active chapter till the




Omicron Kappa Upsilon is a society of dentists whose purpose is as stated in the preamble of the society's first constitution. "To encourage and develop a spirit of those who shall distinguish themselves by high grade of scholar-

The society was organized in 1914 at Northwestern University Dental School. The official insignia adopted in 1915 embodies the spirit of the society. The insignia is a key with the letters, O (Omicron), K (Kappa), and U (Upsilon) by the Greek letter S (Sigma). The first three initials, which indicate the name of this society, are derived from three Greek words, Odontos (teeth), Kai (and), and Hygia (Health). The encircling letter S (Sigma) derives from the Greek word Soteria (conservation or preservation), and represents the all-embracing ideal of conservation which is the chief concern of the dental profession and its oral health service.

There are 46 chapters with approximately 9,500 members. Psi Chapter was founded May 15, 1929, and now has a membership of 114. Its charter members were R. S. Vinsant, R. D. Dean, C. P. Harris, J. F. Bigge, W. E. Lundy, L. J. McRae, J. J. Ogden, J. D. Towner, and W. J. Templeton.

Election to the society is not only a recognition of accomplishment as a student, but also an insignia of both promise and expectancy of leadership in dentistry after graduation.


