Overview

- The UTCOMC offers training to junior & senior medical students from UT & senior medical students from other medical schools who meet UT standards.
- Each year between 150-220 medical students elect clinical rotations in Chattanooga from all required clerkships, senior clerkships, and 45 electives. All required rotations are available in Chattanooga.
- Training is based at Erlanger Health System & Children's Hospital at Erlanger.
- Medical students are considered an integral part of the health care team & receive individualized attention from faculty & residents.
- Many of our students choose to remain in Chattanooga for residency as a direct result of their clinical rotations.
- UT medical students schedule rotations in Chattanooga via the regular UT online scheduling system.

Patient Care and Education: Hands-on Experience in Patient Care and Exposure to a Diverse Pathology

EMERGENCY MEDICINE

- Involvement in care for patients in all 3 settings: Main, Children's, and East Emergency Departments.
- Participation in the emergency care and disposition of acute medical and surgical emergencies and direct involvement in the management of critically ill patients.
- Close supervision by board-certified physicians.
- Routine opportunities to perform minor emergency procedures, such as wound care and abscess drainage.

FAMILY MEDICINE

- 4 weeks on inpatient service and 4 weeks in an outpatient setting.
- Hands-on opportunities in all locations with an option for night float (opportunity to work 1 on 1 with senior resident.)
- Patients of all ages are seen with diverse pathology including heart disease, diabetes, pulmonary disease women's health, obstetrics, pediatrics, sports medicine, office and hospital-based procedures, etc.

MEDICINE

- M3 Clerkship students and M4 Junior Interns are an integral part of one of four inpatient teams, admitting patients, following patients in and out of the ICU's; patient pathology is extremely varied given Erlanger's huge catchment area (exposure to basic medical, neurologic, critical care diseases.)
- M4 students can rotate through Ambulatory Care service where exposure to common medical problems seen in the outpatient setting.
- M4 students can rotate through medical specialties: GI, Pulmonary, Rheumatology, Endocrinology, Allergy, Dermatology, Neuro, Psychiatry, Critical Care, and ID.

OB/GYN

- Two weeks each inpatient OB and inpatient GYN.
- One week GynOnc.
- One week Night Float OB, GYN and ED coverage
- Two weeks clinic REI, Uro-Gyn, Mammography, Regional Obstetrics (MFM), and Rural Outreach Clinic as well as resident clinic, Ultrasound Clinic.
- Skills Lab for 4 hours weekly.
- Active participation in Didactic Sessions for four hours each Friday morning.

ORTHOPAEDICS

- Round on inpatients.
- Attend out-patient office/clinics and the OR with team
- Opportunity to take call with residents.
- Attend all conferences and other teaching events.

PEDIATRICS

Exposure to a wide variety of pathology in the inpatient, general outpatient and subspecialty areas; including

- common peds. diseases as well as uncommon problems and patients seen by the peds. subspecialists.
- Encouraged to do the initial histories and physicals, develop a differential diagnosis and treatment plan.
- Directly supervised by residents and faculty.
- Scheduled series of both didactic and interactive lectures directed specifically for students and also attend the weekly lecture series for residents, morning reports and Grand Rounds.

SURGERY

- Two weeks on each of these services: Acute Care Surgery, Trauma, General Surgery and Vascular Surgery.
- Exposure to other specialty Surgical Services including Pediatric, Breast and Colorectal.
- Six weekday 24 hour call days and two weekend 24 hour call days, eight total 24 hour calls.
- Active participation in Didactic Sessions with various General and Specialty Surgical Faculty.
- Required participation in a Chief Resident directed outpatient clinic, at least once weekly.

UROLOGY

- Shadow physicians in the clinic, hospital and OR.
- Some exposure to procedures.

Teaching (Peers, Nurses, Pharmacists, Premed, High School Students, etc.)

EMERGENCY MEDICINE

- All medical students present a clinical case with relevant teaching points at the end of the 4-week rotation. The presentations are 20 minutes and are required.
- Students update their peers and EM residents with an evidenced based teaching points based on the clinical case.

FAMILY MEDICINE

- Students have the opportunity to work with athletic training graduate students, pre-med, high school, PA students, nurses and care coordinators.
- Students are expected to do several mini-presentations regarding the patients they care for while on the inpatient service as well as give an evidence-based minilecture at the end of their rotation.
- Global health elective to work and teach in Haiti.

MEDICINE

- Medical students are actively involved in teaching each other, nurses, colleagues.
- Students are expected to do several bedside and morning report presentations of pertinent topics involving patient care.
- Medical students actively participate in the hosting of UTC Premed students and the Future Docs and Youth Leadership Forum –programs that host college and senior high school students who rotate with inpatient teams in order to increase exposure to medicine.



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 M3 and M4 students will present cases during morning report, noon conferences, etc.

OB/GYN

- Each student prepares and leads a session for their peers of USMLE "Test Prep" Questions to help everyone for the shelf exam.
- They may teach prenatal classes at the Silverdale Detention Center. Many opportunities for teaching patients in the clinical settings exist.
- Regularly prepare short topic presentations for rounds.

PEDIATRICS

 There are opportunities for students to educate other students and residents particularly on teaching rounds in the hospital and at morning report.

SURGERY

- Students actively participate in teaching of UTC Premed students with the Future Docs and Leadership Forum programs.
- Students will present patients at morning rounds with residents and faculty.

UROLOGY

• Teaching by physicians, nurse & techs.

Scholarly Activity (Research Projects, Case Vignettes, Meeting Presentations, Journal Clubs, Etc.)

EMERGENCY MEDICINE

- Students can work one-on-one with faculty mentors to produce scholarly activity.
- Multiple longitudinal projects are currently collecting clinical data, and students are welcome to assist in any of these ongoing projects.

FAMILY MEDICINE

- Students must prepare an evidence based power point presentation for our conference schedule. This can be on a variety of topics but must involve research in the preparation.
- Daily reading is required, with documentation, to emphasize the importance of continuing learning.
- Optional opportunity to publish Evidence-Based Article.

PEDIATRICS

- Students are encouraged to participate in scholarly activities such as defined research projects, case reports and QI projects.
